Freedom of Information Request, Oxford City Council – Reference: **EIR2024/01100**

Further to our acknowledgement, we can confirm that Oxford City Council can advise as follows in response to your Freedom of Information Request received on 3 October:

Request

I am writing to request information I am entitled to under the Freedom of Information Act 2000. I am requesting the following information related to the Biodiversity Duty:

- * A record of your first considerations of what action to take for biodiversity, which was due to be completed by 1 January 2024.
- * Any policies and objectives for biodiversity which were agreed as soon as possible after this
- * How many hectares of priority habitat you have identified for restoration or creation in the next five years

Response

We can confirm that Oxford City Council undertook a first consideration of its enhanced biodiversity duty under the 2021 Environment Act prior to 1st January 2024. This consideration comprised of the following key elements:

The prospect of an enhanced biodiversity duty was raised internally in a briefing note entitled 'Implications of the Environment Act for the Oxford City Council' in July 2022.

- A [report was presented to Cabinet in March 2023](#) with a proposed approach to the development of a Biodiversity Strategy for the City of Oxford. Whilst the focus of this briefing was on the biodiversity strategy itself, the enhanced duties of the council under the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 (as amended by the Environment Act 2021) were introduced to Councillors at this time.
- In April 2023, a briefing on Enhanced Biodiversity Duty was given to the Net Zero Steering Group by the Council's Ecology and Biodiversity Officer. The aim of the briefing was to draw attention to changes in the statutory duties of Oxford City Council in relation to biodiversity, the introduction of a new process for how these duties should be considered, and additional reporting requirements the Council must fulfil. A methodology for undertaking the first consideration was proposed, and the responsibility for drawing together the first consideration was taken by the Environmental Sustainability team. Teams across the Council would assist with providing personnel and information to complete the consideration.
- In June 2023 a [briefing was given to the Climate & Environment Scrutiny Panel](#) on the development of the Biodiversity Strategy, and its [report presented to Cabinet in July 2023](#).
- The work on the first consideration was carried out from September to November 2023, led by the Ecology and Biodiversity Officer, in collaboration with heads of the following

services: Corporate Assets, Green Spaces, Regeneration, and Housing Services.

- The report entitled 'Final First Consideration of Biodiversity Duty' was drafted for March 2024 by the Ecology and Biodiversity Officer, to summarise the first consideration work carried out in 2023 and subsequently reviewed by relevant colleagues in July 2024. The final report is attached.

* Any policies and objectives for biodiversity which were agreed as soon as possible after this

· A new Oxford Local Plan is being drafted. If approved, the number of policies directly related to biodiversity will increase from one to three. These policies seek to afford additional protection to the most valuable habitats in Oxford.

· Work on the Oxfordshire Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) is being led by Oxfordshire County Council, with input from the Districts and City Council. Officials across several teams in the City Council have attended meetings and workshops, and City Council has also hosted a meeting on the topic for Councillors.

· Work has begun on the development of a City Council Biodiversity Strategy, although this and other First Consideration report actions have been considerably constrained by resourcing, particularly as the Council has been unable to recruit a permanent replacement Principal Ecology and Biodiversity Officer, since March '24.
